The announcement that Entergy would be closing Indian Point completely by 2021 came as a surprise to everyone, including the Library. For HHFL, this loss of PILOT money means a 28% (\$400,000) decrease in our operating budget. Although this is a significant reduction in funds, the Board of Trustees is optimistic that we can find alternative sources of income. We will continue to work with the Town, the community and the school district to ensure that the vital library services this community deserves can continue.


